- War in media: good starting point for comparing political parallelism

War in Iraq in Polish and Norwegian newspapers

- 1. Foreign reports
- 2. Explicit moral evaluation of the war, Saddam Hussein and George W. Bush
- 3. Choice of sources of information
- 4. Newspaper's own approach to the role of media in the war

Analysis

- ▶ Iraq war = 20th of March (the official beginning) to the 10th of April (the official end)
- ➤ Polish newspapers: Gazeta Wyborcza, Rzeczpospolita
- Norwegians newspapers: Aftenposten, Bergens Tidende
- >349 war-related articles analysed

Previous research on media coverage of wars and conflicts

- Journalists are coloured by the foreign policy of their governments
- The newspaper does not necessarily speak with one voice any longer
- Coverage influenced by the security policy between a given country and the U.S.

Approach to the Iraq issue in Poland and Norway

- Poland: governmental support, soldiers sent
- Norway: no support without UN agreement, willing to contribute to humanitarian help after the closing of military operations

Selected results of polls in Poland and Norway on the support of military operation in Iraq

Polish and Norwegian media systems

- Democratic Corporatist Model (Norway)
- Democratic Corporatist Model "will have particularly strong relevance for the analysis of those parts of Eastern and Central Europe that share much of the same historical development, like Poland, Hungary, the Czech Republic, and the Baltic states" (Hallin and Mancini 2004:144).

The Democratic Corporatist Model

- Historically high political parallelism
- Diminishing, but still present, external pluralism
- Persisting legacy of commentary oriented journalism
- Growing emphasis on neutral professionalism and information-oriented journalism

Features of Polish media system shared with Polarised Pluralistic Model

- recent emergence of liberal institutions
- strong position of the Catholic Church
- high ideological diversity among social and political actors

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



- Polish newspapers:
- Reporting from several places in US
- Focus on equipment
- Positive presentation of military operation

- Norwegian newspapers:
- Reporting from Washington
- Focus on people
- Negative presentation

Foreign reports —Iraq focus

- Polish newspapers:
- Dichotomy in presentation
- Cooperation with embedded American journalist (GW)

- Norwegian newspapers:
- Similar presentation in both newspapers
- No cooperation with American journalists

Explicit moral evaluation of Saddam Hussein, George W. Bush and the war

- Polish newspapers:
- Differentiated presentation/inner antagonisms (GW)
- More focus on Saddam Hussein

- Norwegian newspapers:
- Homogene presentation

 More focus on George W. Bush

Media and the war

- Polish newspapers:
- No discussion, but publishing translation of articles and comments from other newspapers (European, Arab, Iraqi)
- Norwegian newspapers:
- Discussion about the role of the media

Sources of information

- Politicians: similar pattern, more diversified nationalities in Polish media
- Military sources: N: talking about problems; P: never talking about problems
- Iraqi/Arabian/Muslim sources: more often quoted and more diversified in Norwegian media

Sources of information

- Moral guides: N: authorities in the secular cultural life; P: the Catholic Church
- Experts: N: humanitarian organisations; P: military officers

Conclusion

- Political paralellism and advocacy traditions strong in both countries, but different
- Norwegian newspapers spoke with one voice, Polish did not
- Polish Media System seems to be much more unstable than Norwegian one
